
Brand New Drama and Dance school

Book Review

The Kashmir Shawl (available as an ebook and paperback)



Rosie Thomas has no doubt called upon her own travels to write this book, set in Wales and India. Mair Ellis clears out her father's house after his death, she finds an exquisite antique shawl, painstakingly hand-embroidered and worth a fortune. Wrapped with it are a lock of a child's hair and a crumpled black-and-white photograph. Mair traces her grandparents' roots back to India and Kashmir, and is inspired to travel there herself to unlock the secrets of the past. It is a journey that will throw her into the path of unrest, tragedy and drama that will change her own life forever. We also follow the story of Nervs and Evan Ellis, Mair's grandparents, who have left Wales to be missionaries in the remote and isolated province of Ladakh, India. This is the 1930's and India is still under British rule. Nervs is feeling dissatisfied with her hard life as the wife of an emotionally inhibited but dedicated missionary and having just lost a baby, is feeling low. As winter approaches, an aristocratic English couple, Myrtle and Archie McMinn, sweep Nerys away from her husband and down to the lakeside town of Srinagar. There, Nervs is caught up in a world of dancing and gossip, luxury and ease - a million miles from her life as a preacher's wife. When Rainer Stamm, an enigmatic mountaineer (and magician) determined to conquer the Himalayas, comes into her life, she is tempted. Yet all the time the drums of war draw nearer, and life will soon change beyond measure. This is a nice book to settle down with on a cold evening. I got a a tiny bit confused with the two stories, which run side by side and I preferred the story of Nerys to that of her granddaughter. This may have been because I was reading the story in short bursts, but any confusion didn't last, and I would recommend it if you have the time to sit down and read it in long sessions. Rosie Thomas writes well and is capable of good descriptive narrative.
