GDPR - Data Protection

In view of the new data protection regulations we have given some thought to the data we hold on residents. We are very happy to be able to communicate by email with as many people as possible, including all members of a household, but have to be careful with regard to keeping and storing your details. As always we ask you to please let us know if your details have changed. Our Privacy Policy will be available on the catney.co.uk web site. The main points are:

1. We only keep a record of the information you have given us on your membership forms: names, addresses, phone numbers and email (if supplied).
2. The data is used solely for the purposes of distributing the Catney News and communicating Residents' Association news and events.
3. This data is stored on one private home computer. It may be shared with members of the committee but will never be shared with any other interests.
4. If you ask to have your data removed we will do so at once. Any address from which we have not had a communication for more than 4 years will be contacted and removed if no response is obtained.

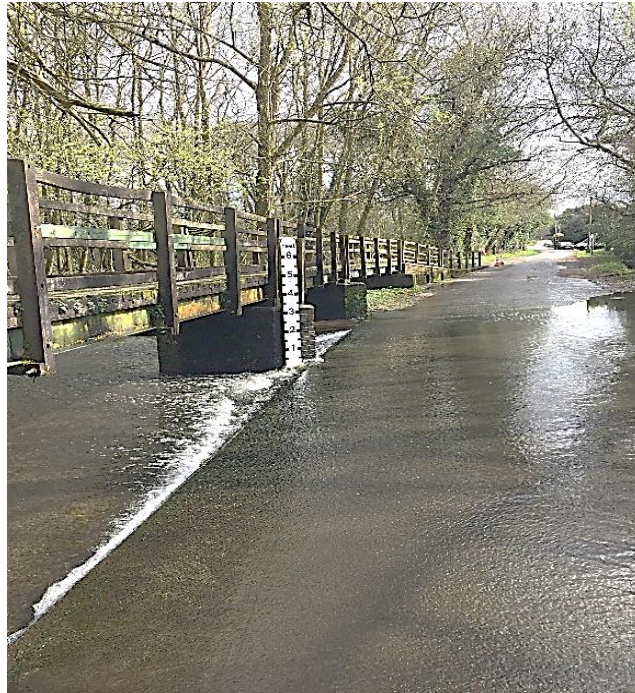

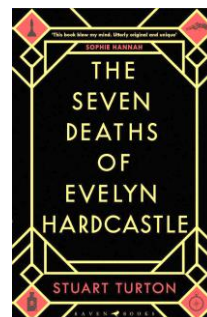
Now spring is really with us and the regular work has started. This year we are hoping to target the docks and brambles on the more open areas, to encourage meadow grasses

THE SEVEN DEATHS OF EVELYN HARDCASTLE **A novel by Stuart Turton.**

If you like complicated, and farfetched, Fantasy Novels, then debutant author Stuart Turton is for you. Regretfully, it's not for me.

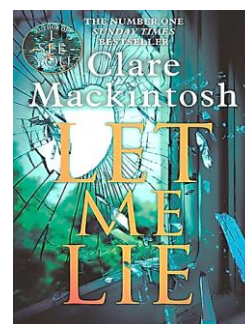
This is a murder mystery but hidden behind the Agatha Christie type people in the inevitable dilapidated Country House, who change into one another in bewildering fashion and supposedly following a pre-determined route to solve the murder and therefor escape.

Apparently, it took freelance travel journalist Stuart Turton four years to write this first novel, it is in the best seller lists and many of you may enjoy it, but personally, I think he should stick to the day job.

LET ME LIE

This novel is in a different league all together. Clare Mackintosh, former police inspector, who lives in the Cotswolds, is a terrific story teller, particularly of psychological thrillers of which this is an excellent example.

I reviewed "I See You" an earlier novel a couple of years ago, which I enjoyed and was not disappointed with Let Me Lie.

Anna Johnson is in a relatively new relationship, with a new baby and is trying to come to terms with the suicides of both her parents. Anna receives a note to suggest her mother may have been murdered, encouraging her to question the deaths of both of her parents.

This author is good at describing believable characters and plot twists. The ending here is particularly good and I recommend Let Me Lie.

GARDENING TIPS FOR MAY



Soft shoot cuttings of hydrangeas, penstemons, fuchsias etc., can still be taken successfully whilst one of the main jobs this month has to be the planting out of hanging baskets and, when the bulbs have subsided, the garden urns. It's that lovely time of the year when gardeners can feel free to let their imaginations run away with themselves to a summer of brilliant sunshine, occasional rain and a riot of tasteful colour throughout. Or why not clash them to be different? Contrast can be very effective in the right place.

Now is a good time to start looking forward to next year. Now that the spring flowering shrubs such as ribes, forsythia, kerria etc., have ceased their annual display, this is the best time to prune into shape for next year. Finally, if you are experiencing strong lawn moss growth this year, so an application of fertiliser and moss killer may not go amiss. But follow the instructions carefully. Don't worry when black patches appear in your lawn as this will be the dead moss which you can rake away and the fertiliser will encourage the grass to quickly replace it.

To keep control of slugs and snails, trap them under tiles or even grapefruit skins remembering to collect them up and dispose of them. Or simply plant things that slugs don't like, such as those with tough leaves, helibores, ferns and grasses or plants that are hairy or shiny leaved.

As for those of you planning on singing "Here we go gathering nuts in May, nuts in May ..." please do it properly. It's "Knots in May" and refers to May blossom, not the month!!
