CHECK YOUR BONFIRES THIS MONTH FOR HEDGEHOGS!!

This baby hedgehog was found a couple of years ago by one of my neighbours in her garden. It was distressed and exhausted as it was completely entangled in some pea netting. Fortunately after a nights rest in my cat carrier it tucked into a plate of cat food and we released it back into her garden, (having cleared the pea netting). After a few attempts I managed to get this photo before I let it go. If I was too close it would curl up into a ball and when I stood back it would slowly uncurl and then sprint off. It could move surprisingly quickly!

This is the only hedgehog I've seen in recent years and I gather hedgehog populations are declining. I get newsletters from the Peoples Trust for Endangered Species who with the British Hedgehog Preservation Society are doing research into this and providing information. They've produced an A-Z guide of Autumn tips on how to encourage and protect hedgehogs in your garden which I thought other residents might be interested in. It includes suggestions such as:

- Not making your whole garden too tidy, (not a problem I have with mine!) so that hedgehogs have leaf and log piles to hibernate in.
- Making sure there's small holes in fences for hedgehogs to go through as they need more than one garden to forage in.
- Checking before lighting bonfires or using strimmers.
- There's also plenty of activities and ideas on their web sites for getting children involved too.



BOOK REVIEW By John Alderson

THE CARRIER

A psychological crime thriller by Sophie Hannah



I had to read this book twice before I felt competent to write a review. Sophie Hannah is well known to readers of psychological crime thrillers, but not to me, and having heard she has been selected to write an “Agatha Christie” novel in the current vogue of Estates of the dead inviting the living to continue the line, I thought I should buy The Carrier.

This is very mature writing, with a number of twists and turns of plot and a suitably ambiguous title, which I found difficult to understand until the very end.....and even then? Gaby Struthers, a very successful business woman, is delayed overnight in Germany and in a somewhat bizarre series of events finds she has to share an appalling hotel bedroom with – to her – an equally appalling and frightened young woman, Lauren Cookson.

Lauren blurts out that she knows of an innocent man who is about to go to prison for a murder he did not commit. More bizarrely, but all part of the plot, Lauren names the murderer as Tim Breary who Gaby knows as the love of her life, and that the victim is Tim’s wife Francine and that Tim has confessed to the murder, but he will not disclose why! The police, and particularly the lead detective, have their own very involved issues to deal with whilst trying to unravel the complicated threads of the plot.

If you are someone who likes to work out the plots of this type of novel and declare “whodunit” by chapter five, I suggest you will have your work cut out and you won’t want to be thinking of half a dozen other things at the same time.

Absorbing, clever and worth reading.

CHRISTMAS FRUIT CAKE RECIPE
(tongue in cheek)

Ingredients:

1 cup water 2 cups dried fruit 1 cup brown sugar 1 tsp salt 8 oz nuts
4 large eggs 1 tsp baking soda 1 cup flour Juice of one lemon
1 cup butter 1 bottle whisky

Method: Sample the whisky to check for quality

Take a large bowl. Check the whisky again. To be sure it is of the highest quality, pour one level cup and drink. Repeat.

Remembrance Sunday – 10th November at 10.45 am in the Village Church



Every year on Remembrance Sunday, our Village Hall reverts back to it's origins and becomes our Village Church again for a Remembrance Day service.

Pete and Steve remind us of why we hold a Remembrance Service each year.

At 11 o'clock on the 11th of November 1918 the fighting in the "Great War" (later known as the First World War) stopped and hostilities ceased. This was an armistice – a cease fire – and "the guns fell silent". In 1919 a Peace Treaty was signed and the war was over.

In honour of all those who had died, a Remembrance Day was held in Britain and the Empire every year on the 11th of November and at 11 o'clock there was a two minute silence. The maroons went off at the police stations, factory hooters sounded and all activities ceased. People in the streets and shops stopped and stood still and schools held a special assembly in the hall. The national service held at The Cenatoph in London was attended by the King and thousands of people from all walks of life.

Thousands of war memorials were built in towns and villages – Birmingham has a Hall of Memory – and Catney has a most unusual war memorial which is used on very special occasions; the memorial is the baptismal font. On the brass plate surrounding the bowl are the names of the seventeen men who died with one more name on the brass water jug. A further six names have been added to the lid of our font of the men who died in the Second World War.

Every Remembrance Sunday, the font is brought to the front of the chancel and during the service the names are read out prior to the two minute silence.

"They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn: At the going down of the sun and in the morning, we will remember them"

We will be remembering them in the Village Church and Hall (next to the Boat Inn on Hampton Lane) on Sunday 10th November at 10.45 am and we hope that you will come and honour those from this village and across the world who died and are still dying for us all.

Remembrance Sunday – Why not stop wherever you are and whatever you are doing for the two minutes silence at 11 am?

Catney Common Update & Working Parties

Working party dates: Saturdays of 30th November, 25th January and 22nd March. All from 10 am to 12 noon.

The extended wet period last year which extended well into this last Spring precluded any working parties on The Common last Winter. For a considerable length of time the path beyond the board walk was under water. I had been interested to see how the clearance that previous working parties had made would affect plant growth. A considerable number of wild plant species have put in an appearance with more light entering following the reduction of the canopy. Examples are Campion, Bind Weed, Cow Slip and various Willow Herb variants. A few stems of Wood Millet have been identified. This is interesting because it shows that this is an area of old woodland. There are of course copious amounts of nettle but bramble is much reduced.

It has been possible, just, to continue the mowing of the Meadow, courtesy of Rob Walker of Oak Farm **with funding from Hampton Parish Council**. The meadow is now in much better condition with much of the tuffet grass removed. Next year the grass-cutting regime will be changed. The emphasis will be to create a meadow complete with meadow plants. These will be left to grow untrimmed until the Autumn. A number of access paths will be cut to limit damage to meadow plants.

Our Council has been doing its bit in strimming the public right of way that runs through The Common. This is especially noticeable on the path towards the style. Indeed, they have continued to maintain the footpath at the top of the canal embankment for some distance.

No grand clearance is planned for 2014. However, there is considerable scope for tidying up deadfall and pulling nettles. To this effect three working parties will be run over the Winter. These have been scheduled for the Saturdays of 30th November, 25th January and 22nd March. All from 10 am to 12 noon. Please come and help keep your Common pristine. Tools will be provided but bringing your own gloves, saws and cutters is always good.

DON'T SPEED THROUGH CATNEY

Dear Catney Residents,

Further to the email below regarding proposed speed limits on local roads in the Barston/Catherine de Barnes/Balsall Common area, I can confirm that our recommendations were considered at the Transport & Highways Cabinet Decision Session last week.

Having considered the diverse feedback received during the consultation process it was agreed that 27 of the proposals would be implemented and lower limits readvertised on the remaining 8 lengths of road. It is anticipated that all agreed speed limit changes in this area will be introduced in the New Year.
