RESIDENTS ASSOCIATION NEWS

Planning applications

PL/2023/01954/PPFL for a Battery Storage Facility on Henwood Lane. The Association organised an open meeting in the Village Hall on the 17th October which was very well attended. The application was vigorously discussed and a presentation of key points were presented as guidance for residents wishing to object to the application. Councillor Cook stressed the need for all objectors to submit letters to SMBC. Earlier in the month we sought local residents' views and 98% of the responders objected to the application with the remainder undecided – no one supported it. When the application goes before the Planning Committee we will seek residents support in attending the meeting when the date is known. After the meeting the pointers, plus a more detailed version of them, was emailed to members with a request for written responses to be submitted to SMBC by 23rd October, When the date of the Planning Committee session is known the date will be placed on our website and Facebook page and emailed to Members.

Thanks to all those who gave up their time to attend the meeting and for your support in trying to stop the development on this prime greenfield site.

Airport News

The first meeting of the Airport Noise Working Group was held on the 19th October and Dave Cuthbert represented the RA. The intention of the group is to develop a new Night Time Noise Action Plan. The group will be looking at issues such as the night time noise level itself, the number of flights being allowed to depart during the night, and fines levied for noisy aircraft. Unfortunately, issues like stopping flights at night are not realistic but having some control on the number of departures will be. We will keep you updated as to developments and would be keen to hear if you have any specific issues you wish to be raised.



A BOOK REVIEW by John Alderson AMERICAN PROMETHEUS

The Triumph and Tragedy of Robert Oppenheimer Kai Bird and Martin Sherwin



This book was first published in America in 2005, in hardback in the UK in 2008 and in paperback in 2009. The recent film, which I have not seen has brought the book forward again and which I read in tablet form. "Prometheus stole the fire and gave it to men" Hence the apt title for the book on the life and work of the man primarily responsible for the development of the Atomic Bomb at the end of the second World War.

The book, which in the format I read, is 1380 pages long divided into five parts but the story is really about the two principal sections of his life; the design and development of the bomb and his personal acclaim, followed 10-15 years later with his "trial" for treason.

I'm sure most readers particularly above the age of 55-60 who will have some knowledge of World War II and the dropping of the two atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, will have their views on the rights or wrongs of the decision. This book touches on Oppenheimer's view before and after the event, whilst exploring the changes in American Military, Political and Public attitudes.

The section of the book dealing with the exercise of putting together the team to design, test and manufacture the bomb, alongside the Military and Political attitudes of the day, makes very interesting reading.

The second section of the story in which one man, Lewis J Strauss, effectively sets out to destroy Oppenheimer in the minds of the American people is an appalling insight into the then workings of American politics and the scientific community.

He very nearly succeeds, but he does succeed in destroying the mind of this brilliant scientist Robert Oppenheimer, who is never the same man again.

Anyone with a general interest in the subject of American modern history and politics will enjoy this book.

I found it a very fascinating read.

Method

NIGELLA LAWSONS THUMBPRINT COOKIES

- 225g Plain Flour
- 50g Cornflour
- 150g Salted Butter, softened
- 100g Caster Sugar
- 2 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 large egg, at room temperature
- Your favourite jam or curd

Step 1

Preheat the oven to 180°C/160°C fan/gas 4 and line a baking sheet with baking paper.

Step 2

Put the flour and cornflour into a small bowl.

Step 3

Put the butter into the bowl of a food processor; add the sugar, the flour mixture, vanilla and egg, and process to form a smooth dough. Or, cream the butter and sugar (by hand or with an electric whisk) until pale and fluffy, then beat in the vanilla extract, then the egg. Once that is incorporated, gradually add the flour mixture to form a smooth dough.

Step 4

Pinch out small clumps slightly bigger than a cherry tomato – each clump should be about 22g. Roll into balls, stopping when you've got to 13, and place on the lined baking sheet, spaced 2½ cm apart. If you do have 2 baking sheets, then by all means form all 26 cookies now.

Step 5

For the 'thumbprint', press down on each ball with a rounded 1 tsp measuring spoon to make an indent, flattening into fat patties around the dip as you do so. The sides might crack a little, but this doesn't matter, and you can smooth any large fissures with your fingers.

Step 6

Bake for 15 mins until just gold around the edges but still pale on top for the melting texture of shortbread, or – for more of a crunch – cook for 18 mins until they're pale gold on top, and slightly deeper gold at the edges.

Step 7

As soon as they come out of the oven, fill the indent with ½ tsp - 1 tsp of curd or jam. You may need to help it off the spoon with a palette knife. Transfer the filled cookies to a cooling rack to cool completely. Repeat with the leftover dough or keep it wrapped airtight in the fridge for up to 4 days, or in the freezer for up to 2 months (thaw in the fridge overnight before use). Rest at room temperature until soft enough to pinch out clumps.

A new kind of Remembrance poppy



For the first time in 28 years, there is a new kind of poppy for Remembrance Sunday this year: it is plastic free.

Director of the Poppy Appeal, Andy Taylor-Whyte explains: "We are very proud to introduce the plastic-free poppy. It will not only enable people to support our Armed Forces community but also continues the RBL's commitment to sustainability."

The new poppy has been three years in the development and making. The aim was to reduce the use of single-use plastic and to "be economical, sustainable, and less impactful to the environment."

The new poppy design has a 40% smaller carbon footprint, and it made from "bespoke red and green paper." The paper comes from a blend of renewable fibres, 50 per cent of which has been recovered from the waste used in the production of coffee cups.

The plastic-free poppy will be available alongside remaining stocks of the current poppy, to reduce any waste of poppies already produced. Poppies containing single-use plastic can be returned to Sainsbury's stores for recycling.

NOVEMBER THROUGH THE YEARS

100 years ago: on 8th Nov 1923 that Christian Barnard, South African cardiac surgeon was born. He carried out the first successful human heart transplant in 1967. (Died 2001.)

80 years ago, from 28th Nov to 1st Dec 1943 that the Tehran Conference in Iran was held. US President Franklin D Roosevelt, British Prime minister Winston Churchill and Soviet Leader Joseph Stalin met to discuss plans for a second front against Nazi Germany. This led to the D-Day assault on Normandy and the Allied invasion of occupied Europe, starting in June 1944.

75 years ago, on 14th Nov 1948 that Charles, King of England, was born.

60 years ago, on 22nd Nov 1963 that US President John F Kennedy was assassinated in Dallas by suspected gunman Lee Harvey Oswald.

Also 60 years ago, on 22nd Nov 1963 that CS Lewis, Irish-born British novelist, literary critic and academic, died. Best known for this book on Christian apologetics, and the Chronicles of Narnia.

Also 60 years ago, on 23rd Nov 1963 that the first episode of the science fiction television series Doctor Who was broadcast in the UK. It is the longest-running and most successful science fiction TV series in the world.

50 years ago, on 13th Nov 1973 that Britain declared a state of emergency as a strike by coal miners caused supplies to dwindle. A 3-Day Week was introduced to conserve supplies.

20 years ago, on 22nd Nov 2003 that England won the Rugby World Cup for the first time.

15 years ago, on 14th – 15th Nov 2008 that the first G20 Summit was held in Washington DC. It was established as a result of the 2008 financial crisis.
