
WELCOME PACK FOR NEW RESIDENTS

BOOK REVIEW

COLOURS OF LONDON A History Peter Ackroyd A book review by John Alderson



Peter Ackroyd is an acclaimed author of a number of books, including a Booker Prize shortlisting, all about or based upon London. In Colours of London Ackroyd sets out to how colour can be used to define areas or events of the City over the years.

The author gives his chapters colour titles, white, blue, green etc. and then uses that colour to explore buildings, events or locations to illustrate his point. For anyone who has worked in or travelled regularly to London as I have, I expected this to be a highly original format to learn more of the City and see it from a different point of view.

Main events, such as the Blitz (red), The Olympics (white) and of course Royalty (gold) are represented by the different colours, but the coming of modern transport, the design of buildings large and small, parks and particularly Social History are themes explored together with the use of colourised photographs.

I found this quite an interesting book, which evoked a few long forgotten memories - remember the London Fog? However my overall impression was that this was an interesting idea but one that doesn't quite work. It seems a bit forced, is frankly too long with some repetition and not enough photographs to accompany the text. This is a hardback book and not designed as beachside reading but if you want to spend a couple of days wandering round London with Colours of London as your guide, you will almost certainly learn something and can make up your own mind on the colour theme.

10 Facts about King Charles III

- 1. He was born at 9.14pm on 14 th November 1948, to Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip, at Buckingham Palace in London.
- 2. He has been heir-apparent to the throne since he was three years old.
- 3. He is the first monarch in British history to have earned a university degree. From 1967 to 1970 he studied history at Cambridge University.
- 4. He can speak Welsh.He spent two months learning the language in 1969, as he prepared to become the Prince of Wales. He still speaks it today.
- 5. He is a qualified pilot and diver. While serving in the military in the 1970s, he trained as a jet and helicopter pilot and became a confident diver.
- 6. He is a keen watercolour painter, a published author, and a music lover, who played the cello at Cambridge. He has done some TV: making a guest appearance on Coronation Street, and presenting the BBC weather forecast.
- 7. As Prince of Wales, he founded nearly 20 charities. Together, they raise £140million each year for good causes. He is passionate about the environment, speaking out against plastic pollution as early as 1970. He has planted many trees during royal engagements.
- 8. Aged 74, King Charles III will be the oldest monarch ever to be crowned in British history. He became King, aged 73, on 8th September 2022, after the death of his mother, the Queen, in Balmoral.
- 9. As head of the Commonwealth, King Charles III is monarch of each of the 14 Commonwealth realms: Antigua & Darbuda, Australia, Bahamas, Belize, Canada, Grenada, Jamaica, New Zealand, Papau New Guinea, Saint Kitts & Devis, Saint Lucia, Saint Vincent & Devis, the Grenadines, the Solomon Islands, and Tuvalu. As King, he's also the only person in the UK who can travel abroad in the Commonwealth without a passport and drive without a licence.
- 10. King Charles III has two children, Princes William and Harry, and five grandchildren. Prince William is next in line to become King and was named the Prince of Wales in 2022.



COUNTDOWN TO THE CORONATION

Of His Majesty the King and Her Majesty the Queen Consort.

On Saturday 6th May the Coronation will take place.

It is based on a solemn religious ceremony which has remained largely unchanged for more than 1000 years. For the past 900 years, the ceremony has taken place at Westminster Abbey, and is conducted by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

King Charles III will be crowned, and then in a similar, but simpler ceremony at the same service, the Queen Consort will also be crowned.

From 6th to 8th May Coronation Big Lunches will be held up and down the UK, and also across the Commonwealth.

On Sunday 7th May a Coronation Concert will be held at Windsor Castle, with iconic locations across the UK lit up using projections, lasers, drone displays and illuminations.

On Monday 8th May there is a special Bank Holiday, giving everyone the opportunity to join in with their communities and good causes through Big Help Out activities. (More details at: https://thebighelpout.org.uk)

There will be a special Coronation anthem composed by Andrew Lloyd Webber.



THE DAY ITSELF

The coronation of **King Charles III** - and his wife, soon to be **known as Queen Camilla** - will take place on Saturday 6 May 2023.

The ceremony at Westminster Abbey will start at 11am after the royals arrive in procession from Buckingham Palace.

After the ceremony, more members of the royal family will join for the procession back to the palace.

The King and Queen Consort will be joined by other family members on the balcony of Buckingham Palace to conclude the day's ceremonial events.

The procession route

Unlike the **Queen** at her coronation, the King and Queen Consort will take the same 1.3-mile route to and from the ceremony.

They will travel down The Mall via Admiralty Arch, take the south side of Trafalgar Square, then go along Whitehall and Parliament Street, take the east and south sides of Parliament Square to Broad Sanctuary, before arriving at the Abbey. The Queen took a much longer route after her coronation, travelling five miles through Whitehall, Trafalgar Square, Pall Mall, Hyde Park Corner, Marble Arch, Oxford Circus, and finally down the Mall to end at Buckingham Palace.

The new King and Queen will travel in the Diamond Jubilee State Coach on their way to the ceremony and use the 260-year-old Gold State Coach for the return journey.

TV coverage will be available to watch for free on Freeview channel 233, Virgin channel 603, BT channel 313, and of course the BBC – see next page for details.

Parks, town squares and libraries will all be transformed into coronation viewing venues.





Friday 5 May

London will be preparing for parades, crowds and street parties. Road closures are expected in central London throughout the whole weekend. **Tube and rail services will be running as normal**, with some changes to bus routes and times. Public transport is likely to be busier. If you're getting around London, plan your journey ahead and check **travel updates**.

You can follow the preparations in London and Windsor on BBC News and bbc.co.uk/news. The coverage will reflect a range of attitudes on the monarchy and the new King and Queen Consort. At 20:00 BST, **Sing For The King: The Search for the Coronation Choir** will be broadcast on BBC One and will also be available on BBC iPlayer.

Saturday 6 May

Westminster Abbey will host the first coronation service in 70 years. Crowds are expected along the Mall, Whitehall and Parliament Square, where the King's procession will be visible.

Invited guests will begin arriving at the Abbey early in the morning.

The King's Procession from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey will take place before the Coronation Service, which starts at 11:00. Once the service is over, it will be followed by the Coronation Procession from Westminster Abbey to Buckingham Palace. Later in the afternoon, the King and Queen will greet crowds from the Buckingham Palace balcony for the flypast.

<u>A special BBC broadcast</u> will cover all the ceremonial events as they unfold throughout the day on BBC One and BBC News. Live streams will also be available on BBC iPlayer and bbc.co.uk/news.

Sunday 7 May

The country will start the day getting ready for **The Coronation Big Lunch**. Neighbours and communities across the country are being invited to share food and fun together.

In the evening, starting at 20:00, **The Coronation Concert** will showcase the country's diverse cultural heritage in music, theatre and dance. As part of the show, various iconic locations around the UK will be lit up with projections, lasers, drone displays and illuminations in **Lighting Up The Nation**.

How to watch: The Coronation Concert will be broadcast live on BBC One, BBC iPlayer, BBC Radio 2 and BBC Sounds.



Monday 8 May

On Bank Holiday Monday, members of the public will be invited to take part in **The Big Help Out**, aiming to raise awareness of volunteering.

Thousands of organisations across the country are encouraging the public to make a difference in their local communities, with plenty of opportunities to **get involved**.

For those staying at home, specially-commissioned programming will be available on iPlayer, including Charles R: The Making of a Monarch, Songs of Praise: A Coronation Celebration and Stitching for Britain.

On the day, Kirsty Young will be in a studio at Buckingham Palace and JJ Chalmers will speak to members of the military as they prepare for one of the largest parades in living history. Huw Edwards will provide commentary as the doors of Westminster Abbey open and Sophie Raworth will be outside speaking to guests as they arrive, Clare Balding will provide commentary for the ceremonial route, and Anita Rani will join the gathered crowds.

Across BBC Radio and Sounds, Martha Kearney will be in the studio, Eleanor Oldroyd will report live from Westminster Abbey and there will be expert insight and analysis from BBC Royal Correspondent Jonny Dymond.

Mishal Husain and James Naughtie will report from different parts of the processional route, giving listeners a sense of the anticipation, pageantry and atmosphere as it happens.

How to watch the Coronation with subtitles, sign language or alternative commentary for people with sight loss

Alongside the signed version of the Coronation on BBC Two, there will be accessible coverage for people who are blind or partially sighted on Red Button, hosted by Petroc Trelawny.

The Coronation will also be the BBC's most accessible live event ever on BBC iPlayer. Viewers will be able to watch with subtitles, sign language, and an alternative commentary version for people with sight loss – all delivered live on iPlayer.

The alternative commentary version will also be available on red button on broadcast channels, and the subtitled, alternative commentary, and signed versions will be available to viewers by pressing red while watching a BBC channel on an internet-connected TV.
